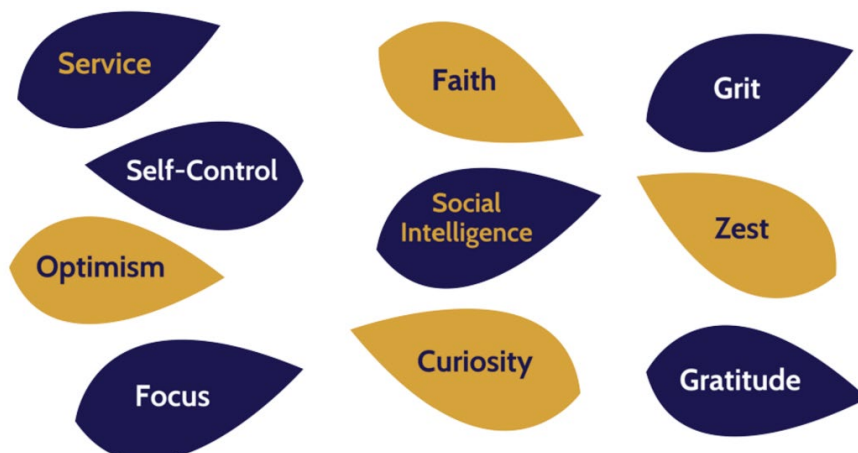
At CCS, we enjoy a connected and inclusive learning environment where education is about more than academics but holistic development.

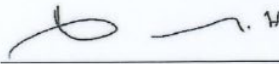

## PROGRAM OVERVIEW

The online learning follows a structured model that includes:

- Synchronous learning: live sessions (Zoom/Teams)

- Asynchronous learning: tasks completed independently
- Blended learning: a combination of face-to-face and online

Distance learning follows the same academic standards as traditional schooling and alignment with the Australian curriculum.

## DAILY STRUCTURE

A typical day includes:

- Morning check-in (must attend 3-4 a week)
- Worship / Bible Studies
- English (Literacy)
- Mathematics (Numeracy)
- Science / HASS
- Specialist subjects (Arts, Technologies, Languages, PE)
- Reflection and Wellbeing

## ONLINE LEARNING MODELS

To meet the diverse needs of students and families, we offer two online learning models. These options provide flexible pathways to ensure students access the curriculum in ways that best support their learning needs.

**Option 1:** Full Curriculum enrolment: where students complete all learning areas online and follow a structured program aligned with the Australia Curriculum developed by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA).

**Option 2:** Partial Curriculum (Numeracy/Literacy) enrolment: where students study selected subjects online while remaining enrolled in another school or home learning for the rest of their learning. If this option is selected it remains the responsibility of the parent/carer to facilitate the overall learning plan for their child that is registered with the appropriate Home Learning education body in their state.

## ROLES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

### ***Teacher responsibilities***

Teachers are responsible for delivering high quality teaching and learning experiences online that are inclusive, engaging and curriculum aligned.

Teachers will:

- Plan and upload curriculum-aligned tasks
- Provide a balance of explicit teaching, guided practice and independent application to learning
- Provide clear instructions, learning intentions and success criteria

- Engage students through interactive learning tasks that include student voice and opportunities for interaction
- Monitor attendance and task completion
- Provide feedback and assessment
- Provide differentiated tasks to support a range of abilities
- Adjust for students with learning difficulties, disabilities, EAL/D needs or social-emotional needs
- Maintain safe online learning environments
- Respond to family communication within the agreed timeframe
- Ensure all online lessons follow professional teaching standards
- Report any child safety concerns immediately in line with mandatory reporting obligations
- Model respectful digital citizenship – online safety, digital footprint awareness, responsible communication

### ***Student responsibilities***

Students are expected to:

- Log in daily and check announcements and learning tasks
- Attend scheduled live sessions on time
- Come prepared with required materials (workbooks device, headphones)
- Complete tasks to the best of their ability
- Ask for help when learning is unclear
- Submit work by due dates
- Use respectful language and behaviour online
- Use online platforms safely and responsibly
- Keep passwords private and secure
- Follow the school's behaviour expectations, digital citizenship and online learning agreement

### ***Parent/Carer responsibilities***

Parents and carers play a key role in supporting student to maintain learning routines and wellbeing at home.

Parents/Carers are encouraged to:

- Support students to establish a daily routine for learning
- Ensure students log in and access tasks regularly
- Provide a quiet learning space where possible
- Ensure students to attempt tasks independently before seeking help
- Communicate with teachers if their child is struggling or unable to complete tasks
- Support appropriate online behaviour and respectful communication
- Monitor safe technology use at home (with age-appropriate supervision)

- Consent to school policy regarding student images, video participation and online learning permissions
- Notify the school if:
  - Students are unwell
  - Technology issues prevent participation
  - Wellbeing concerns arise

## ADMISSION AND ENROLMENT

Students may enrol in online education with Canberra Christian School due to personal learning preferences, geographical isolation or health concerns, in accordance with the school's existing [Enrolment Policy](#).

### ENROLMENTS

Parent/caregivers wishing to enroll their child/ren into Canberra Christian School are invited to complete and return an application form. These forms are available at the office or on our website, just be mindful to include a copy of their Birth Certificate/s and Immunisation Record/s. The following steps will apply once the application is received.

- On receipt of the application form, an appointment will be arranged for a family interview with the principal.
- The application is processed through the School Council.
- Parent/caregivers will be notified of the outcome. This process may take up to five weeks.
- Once a child/ren has/have been offered a position, the parent/care-givers will need to complete the enrolment process by paying the \$200.00 enrolment fee for each enrolment. This fee is credited to your school account and will go towards your child/ren's school fees. Refunds are not given if your child/ren does not attend our school.
- Please ensure that your child/ren's supporting documentation has/have been given to the school as stated on the Enrolment Application Form.
- VISA and CITIZENSHIP information: If you are residing in Australia on a VISA you need to provide a copy of your current VISA with your Enrolment Application. If you were born in another country and have received Australian Citizenship, you will also need to provide a copy of this document with the Enrolment Application.

Once all requirements of the enrolment are met, we send out a letter of acceptance and any additional information that may apply at the time. Feel free to contact us at any time if you have any questions.

### ATTENDANCE EXPECTATIONS

#### **Attendance expectations**

Attendance is recorded through participation in live sessions, task submission and (daily/weekly) online check-ins tasks. A student must attend 3-4 morning check-ins a week. Parents/carers must notify the school of absences and provide medical documentation for extended illness where required. Consistent participation is essential for academic progress.

### Monitoring student engagement

Teachers/administrative staff will monitor student engagement by student log-ins, submitted work, participation in live sessions and communication responses.

### Non-engagement process

If a student does not engage:

1. Teacher/administration contacts family within 2 days
2. Follow-up communication recorded in SEQTA
3. Referral to Wellbeing team / leadership
4. Support plan developed if needed

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## HOW DISTANCE LEARNING WORKS

### TYPES OF ONLINE LEARNING

The online learning follows a structured model that includes:

- Synchronous learning: live sessions (Zoom/Teams/Google Meet)
- Asynchronous learning: tasks completed independently
- Blended learning: a combination of face-to-face and online

Distance learning follows the same academic standards as traditional schooling and alignment with the Australian curriculum. Methods of instructional delivery may include lessons are delivered through live video sessions, pre-recorded materials, discussion boards, printed materials and independent assignments as reflected in Canberra Christian School's [Curriculum Policy](#).

### WEEKLY LEARNING STRUCTURE

Each class will provide:

- A weekly learning overview (posted Monday morning)
- Daily Bible/Encounter program
- Literacy and numeracy learning tasks
- Inquiry/project-based learning opportunities
- Wellbeing and connection activities
- Collaborative learning environments

### LESSON TIME EXPECTATIONS

The recommended learning time:

- Kindergarten: 3 hours/day
- Year 1-2: 3-4 hours/day
- Year 3-4: 3-4 hours/day
- Year 5-6: 4-5 hours/day

## ASSESSMENT PRACTICES

Assessment in the online learning environment may take a variety of forms to provide students with multiple opportunities to demonstrate their understanding and progress. These assessments may include submitted work samples, quizzes, oral explanations delivered either live or through recorded responses, projects and inquiry-based tasks, as well as reflections and learning journals. Using a range of assessment methods allows teachers to evaluate student learning in different ways and support the development of critical thinking, communication, and independent learning skills.

## ACADEMIC INTEGRITY

Students are expected to submit their own work. Parents/carers are encouraged to support learning but not complete tasks on behalf of students.

## FEEDBACK EXPECTATIONS

Teachers are committed to providing regular and constructive feedback to support student learning and improvement. Feedback may be provided through written comments, digital annotations, and assessment rubrics that clearly outline expectations and areas for growth. In most cases, students can

expect to receive feedback on submitted work within five days of submission, helping them reflect on their progress and apply feedback to future learning tasks.

## TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

To support effective participation in our distance learning program, families must ensure that students have reliable access to appropriate technology at home. Each student should have regular access to a dedicated device such as a laptop or desktop computer that can run the required educational software and participate in video conferencing. A stable internet connection is also necessary to access online lessons, submit assignments, communicate with teachers, and collaborate with classmates.

## TECHNOLOGY REQUIREMENTS

### Device Requirements

- Laptop, Chromebook, or desktop computer (tablets and phones are not recommended for full participation)
- Operating System:
  - Windows 10 or newer
  - macOS 11 or newer
  - ChromeOS (latest version)
- Processor: Dual-core 1.6 GHz or higher
- Memory (RAM): Minimum 8 GB recommended (4 GB minimum for basic functionality)
- Storage: At least 64 GB available storage
- Webcam: Built-in or external camera for video conferencing
- Audio: Microphone and speakers (headphones or earbuds with microphone recommended)

### Internet Requirements

- Reliable broadband internet connection
- Minimum speed:
  - 10 Mbps download
  - 5 Mbps upload
- Stable Wi-Fi connection in the student's learning area

### Software Requirements

- Updated web browser such as Google Chrome, Microsoft Edge or Safari
- Ability to install and run school-approved applications and learning platforms
- Access to video conferencing tools used by the school
- PDF reader and basic productivity software (word processing, presentations, spreadsheets)

## HOME LEARNING ENVIRONMENT

Students should have access to a quiet, comfortable, and well-lit workspace that is free from unnecessary distractions such as television, loud noise, or unrelated digital devices. A consistent learning space helps students develop routines and signals that the area is intended for schoolwork and virtual class participation.

## ONLINE BEHAVIOUR AND DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP

Students participating in distance learning are expected to demonstrate responsible online learning behaviour and practice good digital citizenship at all times. This includes communicating respectfully with teachers and classmates during live sessions, discussion boards, and messages; using appropriate language; and following the same behavioural expectations that apply in a traditional classroom. Students should protect their personal information, respect the privacy of others, and use school technology and online platforms only for educational purposes. Recording, sharing, or distributing class materials, images, or videos without permission is not permitted. By acting responsibly and respectfully online, students help create a safe, supportive, and productive digital learning community for everyone.

## COMMUNICATION GUIDELINES

Students are expected to follow clear and respectful communication guidelines when participating in online learning. All interactions should be polite, constructive, and related to learning activities. Students should use appropriate language, wait their turn to speak during live sessions, and keep microphones muted unless invited to contribute. Written communication should be clear and respectful, using proper tone and avoiding slang or inappropriate comments. Students are encouraged to ask questions, seek clarification when needed, and respond thoughtfully to others. Following these communication guidelines helps maintain a positive, supportive, and effective online learning environment for all participants.

## TEACHER COMMUNICATION EXPECTATIONS

Teachers will:

- Post weekly learning overviews on Monday.
- Provide clear deadlines.
- Response times are within 1-2 working days.

## APPROPRIATE COMMUNICATION TIMES

- Teachers are available during the school hours: 9.00 am – 3.00 pm
- Messages received outside of school hours will be responded to during working hours.

## WELLBEING AND SCREEN TIME

Maintaining student wellbeing is an important priority in a distance learning environment. While technology is essential for online learning, it is equally important for students to balance screen time with regular breaks and healthy daily habits. Students are encouraged to take short breaks between lessons to rest their eyes, stretch, and move around. Teachers will incorporate opportunities for offline learning activities when appropriate to reduce extended periods of screen use. Parents and guardians can support student wellbeing by encouraging healthy routines that include physical activity, outdoor time, adequate sleep, and balanced meals. Establishing clear boundaries around screen use outside of school hours can also help students maintain a healthy balance between learning, recreation, and rest.

## PRIVACY AND CHILD SAFETY

Protecting student privacy and ensuring child safety are essential in an online learning environment. Students must use school-approved platforms and follow school guidelines when participating in virtual classes and online activities. Personal information, including home addresses, phone numbers, passwords, or private images, should never be shared online. Students should also respect the privacy of others by not recording, photographing, or sharing class sessions, messages, or student work without permission from the teacher and school. Parents and guardians are encouraged to support safe online practices by supervising technology use when possible and discussing responsible internet behaviour with their children. These measures help create a secure and respectful digital learning environment for all students.

## STUDENT / PARENT AGREEMENT
